

CLIMATE RESILIENCE ROADMAP FOR THE UK BUILT ENVIRONMENT

CALL FOR TASK GROUP MEMBERS

This document outlines the aims, objectives, and proposed methodology for UKGBC's upcoming Climate Resilience Roadmap project and summarises how UKGBC member organisations can apply to be Task Group members. This opportunity is ideal for organisations involved in increasing climate resilience in the built environment.

PROJECT OVERVIEW

This is a critical time for climate action. In the most recent <u>assessment</u> of risks the UK faces from climate-related hazards, over 60% were given the highest urgency score, a staggering increase in urgency compared to the previous assessment. Destructive climate impacts and extreme weather changes will affect all members of our society, devastate lives and livelihoods, and have a detrimental impact on the buildings, infrastructure and environments that keep us secure from hazards such as flooding and overheating. However, as noted in the Climate Change Committee's Investment for a well-adapted UK report, the UK currently lacks associated targets or goals for resilience standards at a national, local or sectoral level.

Following on from UKGBC's <u>previous work</u> around climate resilience and adaptation, we aim to work with the built environment industry to co-create a sector roadmap for climate resilience in the built environment. By developing science-driven, industry-wide targets to be achieved in the short, medium and longer term, this project could help to fill the urgent and critical gap identified by the CCC – investing in and optimising our built environment for a climate resilient future. This project will follow a similar path of UKGBC's Whole Life Carbon Roadmap <u>project</u> which provided both the industry and government a common vision and agreed actions for achieving net zero carbon in the built environment.

The project aims to:

- Define a climate resilient UK built environment;
- Set science-based targets and measurable metrics for climate resilience;
- Measure the baseline climate resilience of the UK built environment:
- Identify the social, economic, political and technical obstacles of climate adaptation;
- Identify the key actions for built environment stakeholders to ramp up adaptation action; and
- Identify key resilience and adaptation policies for national and local governments.

TASK GROUP PURPOSE

The Task Group will contribute significantly to the project's core content. They will ensure that the guidance builds on existing industry knowledge and initiatives and that the output is of a quality and form that is practicable to the intended industry professionals. We will therefore be seeking a level of knowledge and understanding of existing / emerging related industry initiatives and policies within the Task Groups, for

example, TCFD recommendations, the CCC's third Climate Change Risk Assessment, the third National Adaptation Programme (NAP3).

The Task Group will work towards the following key objectives:

- 1. Review existing industry and government outputs and identify gaps in existing information, along with current and planned relevant research.
- 2. Identify key indicators and metrics for measuring climate resilience in the built environment.
- 3. Identify key questions to pose to the industry for testing and refining metrics, targets, and definitions (through an industry consultation exercise).
- 4. Identify the outstanding obstacles for progressing climate adaptation in the built environment.
- 5. Identify key actions needed for a range of built environment stakeholders to improve climate resilience.
- 6. Identify key policies needed for both national and local governments to improve climate resilience.
- 7. Review all final content outputs.

Alongside this, UKGBC and Steering Group Partners will also work towards:

- Gathering, analysing, and presenting the qualitative data from our Climate Resilience Collaboration Café events.
- Undertaking quantitative modelling to identify and map vulnerabilities to climate-related hazards in the built environment.
- Using the above data to measure our baseline resilience to climate-related hazards in the UK built environment.
- Creating an overarching adaptive pathway for the UK built environment, feeding in the key obstacles, actions and policies identified by the Task Group.

TASK GROUP OVERVIEW

We are specifically looking for individuals and organisations with experience and understanding of considering and increasing climate resilience within their sector. We are ideally looking for representation from a wide range of sectors across the built environment, including:

- Landlords / Owners

- Government bodies and Local Authorities

- Attend virtual scheduled task group meetings (see table below).
- Review any papers / reading materials before the meeting.
- Assist with research and writing tasks.
- Help promote industry consultations and seek industry endorsements.
- Help promote the launch of the guidance document.

Whilst the exact work programme for the Task Group is yet to be set, we anticipate Task Group members contributing at least **8 hours** per month across October 2023 - June 2024, and **5 hours** per month from June 2024 to October 2024.

CRITERIA AND APPLICATION PROCESS TO JOIN THE TASK GROUP

Applications to join the Task Groups will be open from until **Wednesday 11th October**.

Applicant Criteria:

- Work for a UKGBC member organisation
- Have a minimum 5 years of relevant experience or very specific knowledge within a relevant topic area, such as:
 - o Existing and emerging industry and academic research, evidence, and policy recommendations
 - o Methodologies for climate adaptation planning and implementation
 - o Technical feasibility and implementation challenges of climate resilience metrics or targets

We encourage applicants from businesses and organisations across the built environment to ensure a diverse range of views and perspectives in the Task Group. These include investors, lender, insurers, developers, contractors, engineers, architects, planners, academic researchers, government bodies, NGOs.

Applicants will be chosen based on their experience, whilst ensuring a diversity of individuals within the Task Group. UKGBC is committed to actively targeting a diverse representation in the composition of all task groups. We want to be inclusive to everyone regardless of ethnicity, religious beliefs, gender, marital status, age, disability, sexual orientation, or political beliefs. This includes targeting an even gender split on this task group.
